100 years later, Druid will weave O'Casey's three plays into an epic theatrical event of conflict, national identity and the human toll of war, DruidO'Casey.

Audiences will experience O'Casey's work as never before: directed by Tony Award winner Garry Hynes, a company of 18 actors will perform the three plays in one day, drawing parallels between an Irish past and an international present. A limited number of individual performances of the three plays in the trilogy will also take place.

DruidO'Casey begins with The Plough and the Stars, the story of newlyweds Jack and Nora Clitheroe living in a city on the brink of rebellion in 1916.



Volcano which premiered at Galway International Arts Festival in 2021 for an audience of just eight people returns to GIAF 2023 for a larger audience at the Mick Lally Theatre. Volcano was the winner of four Irish Times Theatre Awards 2021/22 for Best Production, Best Movement, Best Set and Best Lighting Design.

Cloakroom is the tenth in a series of immersive theatre installations by Enda Walsh following on from Room 303, A Girl's Bedroom, Kitchen, Bathroom, Office 33A, Waiting Room, Changing Room, Bedsit and Middle Bedroom, collectively known as Rooms which he has made with Paul Fahy for Galway International Arts Festival. Rooms has toured to Washington and New York, and most recently to the Barbican London.

Enda Walsh's recent work includes Medicine; the musical Sing Street; the stage adaptation of Max Porter's book Grief is the Thing with Feathers; the musical Lazarus, written with David Bowie; The Same; and The First Child an opera with Irish composer Donnacha Dennehy. His screen adaptation of Claire Keegan's Small Things Like These starring Cillian Murphy recently completed filming. He won a Tony Award for writing the book for the musical Once.



The Saw Doctors last performed at the Festival in 2004 in a double-bill with The Undertones at the Warwick Hotel. Loved and revered by their loyal fans, The Saw Doctors continue with a resilience and an effervescent energy.

The Saw Doctors were discovered by Mike Scott of The Waterboys on a stormy Tuesday night in Galway in the 1980s, plying their trade with more gumption than virtuosity in the back room of The Quays Bar. Scott offered them the support slot on The Waterboys' Irish Tour to launch the *Fisherman's Blues* album in 1988 and they went on to support The Waterboys on their six-week tour of Great Britain in Spring 1989.

The Saw Doctors found success both in Ireland and internationally with chart-topping hits including N17 and I Useta Lover.

This June, the band takes to the Glastonbury Festival's acoustic stage. Their live performances are legendary and this gig at the Heineken® Big Top sees the band return to the Festival stage for the first time in almost 20 years.



Galway International Arts Festival has commissioned the Turner Prize-nominated artist to create a new site-specific installation *The Oligarch's Nightmare*, a maquette of which is pictured here.

Growing up in Fife, this miner's son was immersed in the heavy construction that surrounded him from colliery shafts to oil rigs and steel works to dockyards, set against the beauty of the Scottish coastline and countryside. This has had a huge influence on his work.







Unusual Gestures is an intensely moving and emotionally powerful photographic exhibition. Lorraine Tuck has turned the lens to her own experiences to tell the story of a family living with autism spectrum disorder [ASD], and intellectual disability.

Tuck is the mother of four children, two boys and two girls. The boys have autism spectrum disorder, which in the case of the youngest, is coupled with severe intellectual disability. Unusual Gestures provides insights into the far-reaching implications that neurodiversity and disability present for families.

A further series of works in the exhibition focuses on the artist's uncle Owen who has Down's Syndrome and is gender fluid. At times, Owen chooses to live as a woman called 'Pink'. Owen/ Pink has collaborated with Tuck to produce a series of portraits exploring their fluid gender identity with joyful and refreshing honesty.

At its heart, this exhibition is about love more than autism or disability. Transcending a documentary or issuebased record, Tuck's work is a beautiful and clear-eyed call for acceptance and inclusion.
